



Howard William 'Bill' Taylor Jr.

June 30, 1939 - December 8, 2018

Howard William (Bill) Taylor, Jr., arborist, conservationist, and community volunteer, passed away on December 8, 2018 after battling pancreatic cancer. Bill, age 79, was born June 30, 1939 in Lansing, Michigan, to Howard William and Marguerite E. (Holt) Taylor Sr. Bill was raised in Lansing and attended Lansing Sexton High School. After graduation he attended Michigan State University where he earned a BS in forestry and MA in history. One of his first careers was as a firefighter in the forests of Montana. Bill went to work for the federal government in Washington, DC, where he worked in several agencies, retiring after 33 years of service in 1999 from the National Institutes of Health.

After retirement, Bill moved to Duck Lake. He worked tirelessly after his retirement for causes that he cared about. He was Chairman of the Michigan Wildlife Conservancy in Bath, he wrote numerous articles for the Springport Signal newspaper, and volunteered for the Springport Area Foundation for Education where he helped the Foundation provide assistance to students. Bill also developed his skill in making pies to support the organizations fundraising efforts. Bill and his friend Bud planted over 900 trees on a 40 acre tree farm in Clarence Township, making a legacy of a nature preserve in Calhoun County. Bill and his friends took a special interest in preserving , studying and protecting the soft shell turtles that live in Duck Lake

When Bill was not working on projects, he loved to be outdoors hunting, fishing, and just enjoying nature. He was very fond of hunting in Montana, and fishing in Canada with his friends. Bill was a man of high integrity and he helped others in any way he could, whenever he could. He could always be counted on. One newspaper reporter referred to Bill's quick wit and sly humor.

Bill is survived by his brother Thomas Michael (Sandra); two nieces; cousins and extended family; and many beloved friends who will all miss him greatly.

The family and friends are invited to an Affirmation Service at Pray Funeral Home, Charlotte, Wednesday, December 12 at 1:00 PM. The family will receive visitors

Wednesday starting at 11:30 am at Pray Funeral Home until the service time. Interment will take place in Evergreen Cemetery, Lansing.
